The internet has changed the way we communicate and so changed society and culture. Internet, Society and Culture offers an understanding of this change by examining two case studies of pre- and post-internet communication: letters sent to and from Australia in 1835-1858 and online gaming, respectively. The result is the definition of two types of communication that are lived simultaneously in the twenty-first century. The first is pre-internet and relies on the body having touched and created a message-for example, by attaching a signature-to stabilize the nature of sender, message and receiver. Internet-dependent communication differs because no identity-marker can be trusted on the internet and so styles of communicating are used to stabilise the transmission of messages. Being post-internet means having to live these two contradictory forms of communication at once.
