Deconversion is a dynamical biographical process with long-term, slowly changing causes and consequences. *Deconversion Revisited* includes ten longitudinal case studies representing the lifespan from early adulthood to old age. Ten years ago, in the Study on Deconversion (2009), the variety of migrations in the religious field supported a typology of four types: pursuit of autonomy, debarred from paradise, finding a new frame of reference, and life-long quests and late revisions. A second wave of data collection and re-interviewing that is included in this book yield insight in the stability and change of biographies, faith development, psychological well-being and coping with deconversion.
