He co-edited *Western European Penal Systems* and *The New European Criminology*. Nicola Montagna is research fellow at Middlesex University. He is the editor of *I Movimenti Sociali e le Mobilitazioni Globali* (Milan: Franco Angeli), and is currently researching global social movements from a cognitive and organizational perspective.
